1 Is it OK to hit children? Should you hit children? Poet and broadcaster Michael Rosen faces up to the *Catholic Times* correspondent Lynette Burrows, Britain's most ardent advocate of the 'proper' use of physical chastisement of children.

2 Death penalty Should there be a place in modern society for the death penalty? Can it be a deterrent? Is it a fitting punishment? Does it brutalise? Interested parties in the USA argue it out.

3 Trade unions at work Young workers in a variety of work settings make the case *for* and *against* trade union organisation in the workplace. Should you look after yourself or is there strength in numbers?

4 Nuclear power A classic example of a public interest issue obscured by politics and selective science. A ground breaking television documentary unravels the industry's case that nuclear power is a viable and safe source of UK energy.

5 An eye for an eye A mother whose son was killed, feels her life can only be restored by meeting the youth responsible for his death. Angela, whose loved one was murdered, wants revenge on the killer. Emotively argued opposite views.

6 Organic food An organic farmer, intensive farmer, a chemical industry rep and others argue about the use of chemical pesticides in the production of our food.

THE ANIMAL DEBATE is a high quality DVD Res providing a wealth of information on one of the major moral issues concerning students today.

DEBATE 1 FOXHUNTING: The case for foxhunting is made by the Master of the Warwickshire Hunt. Students follow the hunt and talk to young and old participants as well as a farmer and a representative of the British Field Sports Society. **The case against foxhunting** is made by the manager of a wildlife sanctuary. Students visit the sanctuary to hear the case for the protection of the fox, talk to a farmer opposed to hunting and The League Against Cruel Sports.

DEBATE 2 INTENSIVE FARMING: The case for intensive farming is made by a broiler farmer, a dairy farmer, a livestock transporter, a representative of the National Farmers' Union. **The case against intensive farming**

DEBATE 3 MEDICAL EXPERIMENTS: The case for the use of animals in medical research is made by Professor Michael Stock when the students visit the animal house of a medical research laboratory. Also supporting the arguments are pharmacologist Professor Colin Blakemore.

The case against the use of animals is made by Professor Chris Atterwell, when the students visit a cell culture laboratory. Also supporting the argument are Dr. Gill Langley, scientific advisor for an anti-vivisection research trust, Ken Livingstone MP and a representative from Animal Aid.
